Clayton Valley Village Gains Fiscal Sponsor

Diablo Valley Foundation for the Aging Backs CVV

First Fundraiser Packs La Veranda in Clayton

Clayton Valley Village kicked off its fundraising effort with a dinner and silent auction at La Veranda restaurant in Clayton on October 26. More than 70 people from Clayton and Concord attended to meet the CVV start-up committee and learn more about the Village progress over the past few months.

CVV members were outnumbered by newcomers who were there out of curiosity and to meet others who have become interested in the village movement.

Committee members Sonja Wilkin, Maria Xiaris, and Jim Whitfield each spoke briefly on the current state of the organization. The audience heard that Clayton Valley Village is the newest village in Contra Costa County, joining the Lamorinda village which is scheduled to start up in spring, 2015.

In August, Diablo Valley Foundation for the Aging and CVV signed a fiscal sponsorship contract, which will be overseen by the DVFA and its Executive Director, Robert Kain. CVV thus takes a leap forward as it continues in its development stage.

Diablo Valley Foundation for the Aging is a not-for-profit corporation providing community service to older adults in Contra Costa County since 1975 and has continued to be a leading agency in senior services.

CVV has taken a great step forward since garnering the fiscal sponsorship of the Diablo Valley Foundation for the Aging.

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Founded by a group of community leaders including Dean S. Lesher, former publisher of the Contra Costa Times, and Katharine M. Grant, a social worker, the Foundation is committed to providing vital services to aging persons who are at risk because they are alone, isolated, pressed by financial problems, or are confused.

A key focus of DVFA is to prevent inappropriate institutionalization of elders by providing the necessary support to maintain them in the community with as much independence and freedom as possible. They offer four major service components: geriatric care management, personal assistants, a respite center for caregivers, and private fiduciary services.

During the period of sponsorship, CVV will be included under the DVFA 501c3, which affords CVV non-profit status.

õWe are still at least a year away from opening, which will depend on our ability to raise the necessary funds to sustain our Village. We are pleased at the community support and enthusiasm we have received and feel sure we can achieve our goal,ö Xiaris said.

Clayton Village Goes to Washington


Clayton Valley Village was well represented at the 6th Annual National Village Gathering, a three-day conference, Sept. 29-Oct. 1, in Washington D.C. CVV members Jim Whitfield, Sonja Wilkin, and Marilyn Wollenweber were there with nearly 280 other conferees.

The group had the opportunity to advocate with legislators on behalf of the Village movement and for a seat at the 2015 White House Conference on Aging.

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They also had a chance to bid in the silent auction, which featured very attractive items donated by local residents and businesses. Among the biddables were a quilt, a rug, a week at a condo in Whistler, B.C., fine wines, coffee, paintings, a photography session, a restaurant certificate, a succulent garden-in-a-box, and numerous handcrafted items. The event raised over \$2,800 toward getting CVV up and running.

On the õDay on the Hill,ö they met with Rep. George Miller of the 11th California District. Later, they talked with a staff assistant to Sen. Diane Feinstein.



First CVV Survey Launched

Studies by the National Village to Village Network show that every village is different, and each of the 100 existing villages (with more than that under development) must design its menu of programs and services to suit the specific needs of its members.

Clayton Valley Village is in the process of distributing a survey to determine what the potential members in its Clayton-Concord service area want from a village. What do they need now? What will they need down the road? What sort of dues are they comfortable paying?

The survey form, pictured above, has been sent to everyone who has attended meetings. The survey process will continue into the foreseeable future.

If funding can be raised, the committee anticipates mailing the survey to everyone in the targeted ZIP code areas. The survey was developed by the committee of Marilyn Wollenweber Kathy Carr, Christine Jeffers, Nancy Hoffman, and Carol Riley.

- Two of three Director positions.

The third director slot goes automatically to Robert Kain of the Diablo Valley Foundation for the Aging, since DVFA is CVVøs fiscal sponsor. Mr Kain will serve for three years. The other two Directors will serve one- and two-year terms. In 2016, a new Director will be elected for two years, thereby allowing for staggered terms and continuity.
