- Constitution Day, celebrating the ratification of the governing document of the United States, is observed on the 17th. Also, Citizenship Day, National POW/MIA Recognition Day, National Apple Dumpling Day, and National Monte Cristo Day
- The autumn equinox, which is the traditional transition from summer into fall, takes place on or around September 22nd, depending on the year.
- September 30: National Love People Day, National Chewing Gum Day, National Hot Mulled Cider Day

Transfers, exemptions and the effect on inherited properties.



Book Recommend by Mary Esther Loranger

This book is about the many back stories involved in the handling of the 2020 Corona virus pandemic and about our country's slow response to it. It was written during the unfolding of the pandemic. It reads almost like a detective novel except that the characters herein are real. It takes place principally in California. Some names stand out: Drs. Charity Dean, Richard Hatchett, Carter Mecher, biologist Joe DeRisi to name just a few. They were part of a group of doctors called the "Wolverines" who early on knew what was happening with this coronovirus outbreak in China. Having been thwarted previously by government inaction and bureaucracy they knew what our country was facing and set out to take the necessary steps to protect the population. This was not done in a vacuum. They were able to get help from the medical, scientific, technology communities to get the money, information, data, testing labs, chemicals, supplies and volunteers necessary to get moving. There are so many details in this story that are truly startling and relevant in regards to the situation that we are still in. It raises many questions regarding our country's public health system, the pre-planning for national emergencies, government's ability and willingness to help to cut through red tape and to override inaction to get things going in the face of a pandemic. What really intrigues me is the way author Michael Lewis has of taking complex and arcane subjects and breaking them down so that the normal person can understand them. He does that in most of his books, and again here, through the dramatization of ordinary people who steadfastly remain true to their principles. You will probably want to reread it!
