The Curious Case of the Wilbar

When I lived in Houston in the 80s, I worked for a film production company that specialized in business and educational films. One assignment had me flying from Houston to Cumberland, Maryland, to conduct research for the script I was to write on labor-management relations. The client was the Appalachian Regional Commission and the film was to cover activities in Cumberland.

There are no direct flights to Cumberland from Houston (or probably from anywhere else). I got there on a 4-seater, single-engine plane from the Greater Pittsburgh airport. My traveling companion was a woman about my age who was not vey talkative. But then, neither was I. Even though we were seated facing each other, our eyes rarely met. We kept our noses buried in papers retrieved from our respective briefcases, the better to try ignoring the deafening noise of "the little engine that could." *Oh, God, that motor is the only one we have, please let it grind on to Cumberland.*

The bumps and swerves and sudden dips grew more violent as we soon flew over taller mountains. Mountains in this part of Appalachia hardly rival the Rockies. Below were rounded, forested hills with deep valleys between them, isolated enough to hide an abandoned coal mine or a moonshine still.

The flight took less than an hour, a very long hour. My companion and I looked down as we circled the Cumberland airport. Our eyes met, mirroring each other's terror. To build the airport, hardy Marylanders, or perhaps the Corps of Engineers, had scraped off the top of one of these mountains just enough to squeeze in a runway. As we descended, I could only hope that the runway was long enough.

We made it, and I spent the next three days experiencing the sights and sounds of Cumberland. A fellow from the Appalachian Regional Commission took me on a tour, which included a stop on the outskirts of town to look at a canal boat. The historical marker next to the forty-or-so foot-long replica proclaimed that the boat was like those that plied the canal linking Cumberland to the Washington, DC suburb of Georgetown, 184 miles to the east. The Chesapeake and Ohio Canal was in its commercial heyday in the 1850s. Now it's merely a tourist attraction and hardly the job creator the canal once was.

The Appalachian Regional Commission was all about bringing jobs to places like Cumberland. To make Cumberland attractive to companies from outside the area, the Commission was working to ease relations between labor and management in the few factories that remained. I spent an entire afternoon observing a labor-management meeting at a glass factory.

The meeting went smoothly for at least an hour, with each side willing to make concessions on work rules. Yes, the union would allow a non-electrician to plug in the grinding machine after its daily maintenance, instead of waiting for a union electrician to come over from the next building to stick the plug in the socket. Until the compromise, non-union die-makers could plug in their personal portable radios by themselves, but not the grinding machine. All was humming along at the meeting until someone brought up the subject of the wilbar.

The head management rep explained that, since three wilbars had turned up missing over the past few months, management decided to keep them locked up in chain-link-fenced area at the far end of the warehouse, and only one foreman had the key.

Union workers from several different departments voiced their objections to this draconian rule.

"I need to use a wilbar every day," one complained, "and it's a waste of time to have to look up Charlie Steinburner to unlock the cage to the wilbars."

"Yeah," groused another, "y'all are demanding increased production, but y'all are standing in the way. Wilbars are just one piece of it."

I was befuddled. What the heck was a wilbar? Whatever it was, it struck a spark in an otherwise hum-drum afternoon.

I was about to ask for clarification, when suddenly the context revealed the nature of the "wilbar."

I hadn't been in Appalachia long enough to pick up on the slang and the accent. Here I was amongst men who said things like "I'ma fixin' to sit a spell 'fore I go down street."

When they said "wilbar," they were talking about what an outlander like me would call a "WHEELBARROW."

I made a note on my yellow pad: an economic infrastructure can collapse – for want of a wilbar!

Past President, Sonja Wilkin presented Jim Whitfield with a gift card from REI in appreciation for his years of great work for CVV as a pastpresident, board member and volunteer coordinator. Treasurer Joanne Wasak gave a report on our financial status. A door prize donated by Dr. Keith Bradburn Dentistry of Clayton (a Sonicare electric toothbrush along with various dental hygiene "goodies" valued at \$130) was won by volunteer Margaret Bachman (shown receiving the door prize from President Sue Manning in the collage below).

I was introduced and gave a short talk about my responsibilities as Executive Director and my vision to help build recognition for Clayton Valley Village throughout the Clayton-Concord area and as a valued community asset. After attending the National Village to Village conference in Chicago and hearing about the many amazing

programs that are being offered by other villages throughout the country that are having an enormously positive impact on their communities, I came home with a burning enthusiasm to help implement some version of those programs in our community.

One of these programs called "Read2Me" involved village members reading with 2nd graders at an elementary school. That program was directly responsible for raising the school's ranking from the bottom in the state to number 3 in the state. Another program that touched my heart was a mentoring program called "When I'm 65." It was a mentoring program that paired Village members with college seniors who chose to be involved in the program. The students filled out a questionnaire indicating their professional goals and dreams. They were matched up with Village members who were (or had been) in a similar profession. 
Clayton Valley Village February Mixer
