Learning Local History - Part I of 2: Don Salvio Pacheco and Early Concord By Fiona M. Hughes



On a rainy, pre-Covid Sunday afternoon I took a delightful, guided tour around the Galindo House, on Amador Ave., Concord. It's a handsome, grey Victorian house I've driven past many times, idly wondering what its story was, and yesterday was a good day to find out, since they are open from 1-4pm on Sundays only.

Presumably because I was their only visitor, three docents generously guided me through the house, engaging me with interesting facts about the house, the Galindo family who lived there, and how it correlated with Concord's early history. Anyone familiar with Concord and surrounds will recognize the family names of Salvio,

Pacheco, Galindo, Amador, and Bernal, all of which featured in the proud history of the Galindo family.

Here I learned that one of Concord's founding fathers was Don Salvio Pacheco, born in Monterey, CA in 1793. Don Salvio was the son of a Spanish Army officer who had arrived with the Anza expedition of 1776, and settled in San Jose. Don Salvio himself enlisted in the Army at age 17, did a stint at the SF Presidio, married and raised a family of five children, and later became the mayor of San Jose.



In 1834, Don Salvio Pacheco petitioned for, and was awarded by the Spanish/Mexican government for his service to Spain, a land grant of 17,921 acres of land. In what is now Contra Costa Country, was then known as Rancho Monte del Diablo. This means 'thicket of the devil", referring to the area's willow thickets (hmmm, Willow Pass, anyone?!). The granted lands ran from Walnut Creek east to the Mt. Diablo foothills, present day Concord and Pleasant Hill and up to the Carquinez Straits.

Don Salvio was a generous and prudent man, and astutely recorded and rerecorded his land grants (sensible, since the USA was about to take over California). Because of his mayoral duties in San Jose, his son, Fernando, was sent immediately to establish a rancho on the grant, hire men to run cattle and develop the rich agricultural land.




