Some no longer can make the trek back for health reasons, but all who could did so, are active and engaged in life! This month we are featuring CVV Founding Member, Jeanne Boyd.



With summer's arrival, there's nothing nicer than being able to wander down into the heart of Clayton on a Saturday morning, to buy fresh, luscious, local produce from our very own Farmers' Market!

Clayton Valley Village now has a booth at the Saturday Farmers' Market, where we provide info about our Village movement, membership benefits, and answer questions about volunteering. It's been a lot of fun manning our smart little booth, since we see so many familiar faces, and meet new people, who are keen to stay in their own homes in the town they've chosen to call home, right here in our beloved Clayton.

The weekly Market brings us locally grown fresh produce straight from the farm, as well as pasture-raised meats, plus handmade breads, pies and pastries, nut's and more. The musicians definitely add ambiance, as market shoppers pause to listen, chat, and enjoy the gathering. Currently, the cherries are at their best, according to the vendor, and the peaches are dripping with juice. We're so fortunate to enjoy the bounty that the Farmers' Market brings, and it's important to shop here, otherwise it'll cease to be profitable for vendors and will disappear.

As one market vendor commented, "I really enjoyed conversing with customers, the music (a different band plays weekly), and exploring the locally grown produce offered by other vendors."

The Clayton Farmers' Market is set up in the parking lot at 6095 Main St. every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., rain or shine until Sept. 22 (no Market Sept. 1).




CVV Monthly Mixers
